Clifford A. Heinrich, 94 of Cape Girardeau, MO passed away Saturday, March 28, 2020 at the Lutheran Home.

He was born August 10, 1925 to George and Hazel Heinrich in Chicago Illinois.

Cliff was a World War II Veteran earning the rank of sergeant in the U.S. Army Air Corps where he was the Rear Tail Gunner on a B17 Bomber.

Clifford earned many awards for service to his country which included the American Campaign Medal, World War II Victory Medal, Army Good Conduct Medal, European-African Middle Eastern Campaign Medal and the Purple Heart for his service during World War II. Cliff was always so proud of his service to his country and being able to serve and it showed when he would speak of his time in the service.

After World War II he married Shirley Thielgaard and between them they had 3 children Bruce, Allen, and Keith. Clifford and Shirley lived in Bensenville and Elmhurst Illinois prior to moving to Cape Girardeau, in the 90's.

Clifford was a master technician for 3M. He enjoyed golfing in the day, fishing, good food, visiting with friends from the Hoover Center and antiquing. He also loved to watch a good Cardinals game and was still loyal to the Cubs as well living in Chicago for so many years!

He is survived by his sons, Bruce (Angela) Heinrich and Allen (Pat) Heinrich and many grandchildren and great grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his parents, wife Shirley, and son Keith.

A private service will be held for the family Wed., April 1, 2020 with Elijah Allen officiating. Full military honors will be conducted at the funeral home.

Private burial will follow at the Missouri Veterans Cemetery in Bloomfield, Missouri.
