He worked on my Grandfather's dairy farm when he was in high school and his mother was my 4th grade teacher. He taught me the honor of being an Eagle Scout and gaining life skills. He went to Philmont Scout Ranch. He showed me how to be brave in the woods and have fun living off the land. He taught me to pay attention. He gave me pigeons and amazed me with a pigeon that he taught to do a flip mid-flight; he called them rollers and tumblers. I forever will remember him in a denim shirt, sleeve-less, tanned and freckled, straw cowboy hat, showing me how to load chopped silage into the tall silo. He could mow my Grandfather's fields in third gear. He challenged a scrawny kid to physical duels and taught me to be aggressive at baseball. He loved to sling bales of hay from the field and make bale tunnels into the loft. He was not afraid of sweat.
