I also have three great grandchildren. I hope that my relation with them and to each of you has been a positive and pleasant one. I would also like to wish my wife Iris Likens a long and pleasant journey in her remaining years. And to my sister Dorothy Jane Boyd, I will miss you.

Afterword by his sons:

Our father would never want to mention some of the interesting achievements during his 96 years of life, but we would. Dad proudly served his country in World War II from 1943 to 1946 as a US Army Infantry Scout in the European Theater. After the war he earned a B.S. degree in Electrical Engineering from the University of Rolla in 1948. His first job was with Phillips Petroleum in the oil fields of Wyoming. After moving to Cape Girardeau in 1950, he worked for the Missouri Utilities Company for over 37 years. Dad was a long time member and Deacon of the Abbey Road Christian Church. He was an avid member of the Kiwanis Club for over 30 years, as well as being past president. He was also a long time

member and past-President of the Toastmasters Club. One of the many ways Dad gave back to his community was as a volunteer; as a judge for the Central High School science fair, delivering Meals on Wheels, helping build the JC Public Golf Course, and finally working on the “Red House” in Cape. After retiring from volunteering, he finished his first century (100 mile) bike ride at the age of 83. As dad would say “Good Night!” I can’t believe I made it to 96.

Fishing, fishing, fishing and more fishing. Fishing was his favorite pastime but he also enjoyed hunting, camping, biking and traveling. He passed this love of fishing on to whomever he could.

“ Bill and I worked out at St. Francis Fitness. When Bill's eyesight got so bad he could not drive, I was honored that, for several years, he agreed to let me pick him up and take him to workout M - W - F mornings around 0630 hours. We haggled nearly weekly over the fee. Pretty much it was a \$1.50 cup of coffee each Monday. I threatened to get the Teamsters involved once when seeking a raise. I had to settle for a Christmas bonus extra cup.

Bill only told me one time about his WWII experience. He likely would not approve me sharing what I know here. (He would tell anyone who asked "I have spend a half century trying to forget, I don't want to talk about it!")

But, I worked for the Missouri Veterans Commission for 30-so years and I think it should be told.

Bill fought all the way through Europe with Patton's Third Army. His feet were a life long problem after suffering frostbite during the Battle of the Bulge, where he was involved in hand-to-hand combat. He was among the first to liberate a Nazi Death Camp and a P O W camp.

With the passing of Bill Likens, we have lost one of he Greatest of "The Great Generation."
