James Woodrow (Woody) Niswonger, 89, passed away Saturday, April 2, 2011 at his home in Blue Springs, MO. He was born May 29, 1921 in Kurreville, MO. He was a son of Givens O. and Rada Niswonger. He and Mary Belle Ford were married April 5, 1942 at Jackson, MO. She preceded him in death November 25, 2001. He graduated from Jackson High School where he was captain of both the football and basketball teams. He was inducted into the U.S. Army on June 7, 1943 and was honorably discharged on December 24, 1945 as a Staff Sergeant. He served his country in the Pacific Theatre. He moved his family to Cape Girardeau in 1957 and worked for American Optical as a manager for over 20 years. He also worked at the SE Missourian and Tom Meyer Realty. He came full circle and retired from Eye Consultants in 1983. He is a member of Lynwood Baptist Church in Cape Girardeau along with the VFW and American Legion. His loving survivors include daughters, Donna McClain, Blue Springs; Nancy Gerecke (Bob), Blue Springs; five grandchildren: Robin Drum of Cape Girardeau, Julie Upchurch of Scott City, Rob Gerecke, Dave Gerecke, and Bryan Gerecke, all of Blue Springs; 9 great grandchildren, and 8 great great grandchildren.
