Leonard Edward Pfeiffer, 88, of Jackson, Missouri died Thursday, August 6, 2020 at his residence.

He was born October 14, 1931 in Shawneetown, Missouri to Oswald Arthur and Ella Lydia Oswald Pfeiffer.

He and Dorothy Ruth Eggers were married July 31, 1954.

He served in the Air Force as military police. After completing Air Police training in Camp Gordon, Georgia, he served a tour of duty in French Morocco during the Korean conflict. He was then transferred to Neah Bay, Washington where he was later honorably discharged.

For over 40 years he was owner/operator of his own trucking company. After he retired from trucking, he enjoyed being a charter bus driver. He drove for Eggemeyer Transportation and later Southwestern Illinois Bus Company.

He was a member of New McKendree United Methodist Church in Jackson and Altenthal Joerns American Legion Post 158.

Survivors include his wife, Dorothy Ruth Pfeiffer of Jackson, Missouri; one daughter, Linda (Jerry) Mowery of Jackson, Missouri; two grandchildren,

Christopher (Libby) Leimer and Caroline (Robert) Thornburgh; and three great-grandchildren, Brayden and Quinton Thornburgh and Madeleine Leimer.

He was preceded in death by his parents; one brother, Harold Pfeiffer; two sisters, Verna Schade and Helen Hecht.

A graveside service will be 10:00 am Tuesday, August 11, 2020 at Russell Heights Cemetery in Jackson with the Rev. Jimmie Corbin officiating.

“ -I have many fond memories of Leonard. I conducted a lot of historical tours for the University when I was employed there. Leonard was often the driver for those tours. On our very first tour together I could tell by the time we had gone many miles that "this driver" was a professional. I had so many tours with Leonard that I told later groups that we had a great driver for this trip, that he and I had traveled "a million miles together and never had an accident or a bus break down." And we did have a lot of miles together. All of the trips I ever took with Leonard were reassuring and fun.

Leonard was a great driver----personable, safe, considerate and always polite and fun. He was the epitome of a safe and careful professional driver. One of the best I have encountered. On one occasion we did a tour of regional Civil War sites with a planned stop at Lambert's, in Sikeston, for lunch. About five miles south of Sikeston the bus died on I-55. Leonard got out, did some magical things with the transmission, and soon had the bus ready to go -- but there was something substantial wrong. He apologized to the passengers, and said that we did have a bit of a problem and he would try to get us into Sikeston and take care of it while we were having lunch.

So it was! He dropped us off at about 12:00 noon, we had a great lunch, Leonard tore out of the parking lot after telling me he would try to be back by 1:00 o'clock. When we came out of Lamberts Leonard was pulling in right at 1:00 p.m. I am not sure what he did, perhaps it is good that I did not know then, but I believe he went to one of the salvage shops in Sikeston, bought the essential part, installed it himself, and had us back on the road at 1:00 p.m. That was Leonard. I never knew what he did, and it may be good that I did not. When I asked him what he did, he simply smiled that warm shy smile that I will never forget, and said "well, it works now." He missed lunch at Lamberts that day, and would not take anything to compensate. He knew everything about what made engines work, and not work.

Leonard Edward Pfeiffer was one of the best drivers to turn a bus onto a highway. He was also one of the best human beings to walk on this earth. What a fine and memorable person. When driving and I meet a bus, I look for Leonard.
